MEGAN CHANG—Piano Soloist —performing Piano Concerto No. 1 in C Major, Op. 15, 1st movement—Ludwig van Beethoven

Megan Chang is an 11-year-old sixth grader and honor roll student at Calle Mayor Middle School. She began her piano studies at the age of four at Torrance Yamaha Music Center and has been a student of Sylvia Ho since 2007. Megan has been the recipient of numerous awards, including five awards in the Open Category of the Southwestern Youth Music Festival (2008-2011), First Place in the Annual Young Musician Competition sponsored by the Chinese-American Education Association (2009), and First Place in the 2011 MTAC Scholarship Auditions. In May, 2011, Megan was invited to participate in the “Class Act” Concerts with the Pacific Symphony at Renée and Henry Segerstrom Concert Hall. In April of this year, Megan won MTAC’s State South Regional Competition (Division I). She enjoys composing music and was selected to

perform her original compositions at Yamaha National and Regional Junior Original Concerts (2008-2012). This will be Megan’s second appearance with the Beach Cities Symphony; at her first in 2010, age 8, she performed Mozart’s Concerto No. 8 in C Major.

Tiffany Chung is a 16-year-old junior at Palos Verdes Peninsula High School. She began her violin studies at the age of five and is currently studying under Gail Gerding-Mellert. Tiffany has participated in master classes with Lorenz Gamma, Linda Wang, Almita Varnos, and Alice Schoenfeld. She has also participated in the Montecito and Lamont Summer Festivals. She has

achieved the Panel Level of the MTAC Certificate of Merit Program and is currently a Young Artist Guild finalist. She is the concertmaster of her school’s orchestra, a first violinist of the Colburn Chamber Orchestra, and a member of Colburn’s Chamber Music Institute. *continued inside*

Although she has dedicated a lot of her time to violin, Tiffany recently received the President's Volunteer Service Award, is a member of her school's National Honors Society, a co-president of her school's Latin club, and enjoys reading.

ISABELLA MA—Violin Soloist—performing Violin Concerto in E minor, Op. 64, 1st movement—Felix Mendelssohn.

Isabella Ma, a 16-year-old junior at Palos Verdes Peninsula High School, has been playing the violin since the age of nine. She has been studying with Elmer Su since the age of 11. She has won many trophies, some of them first place, every summer since 2008, competing in the Southwestern Youth Music Festival (SYMF). She won first place in the American String Teachers Association (ASTA) Competition in 2012. This year she took first place in the MTAC South Bay Vocalists, Orchestral Instruments, and Chamber Ensembles (VOCE) Competition and will advance to State Finals. She has also been an active member of the Palos Verdes Regional Symphony Orchestra since 2009. She has performed as soloist and in quartets and duets with the orchestra and was featured as a soloist in March, 2013. Isabella began playing piano at age six, studying with Anli Lin Tong and is the recipient of many awards, one of which brought her to the Beach Cities Symphony stage as an MTAC Competition Winner in 2011. That evening, she performed the first movement of Chopin's Piano Concerto No. 1 in E minor.

ROBIN PARK—Piano Soloist—performing Piano Concerto No. 3 in C Major, Op. 26, 1st Movement—Sergei Prokofiev.

Robin Park is a 17-year-old senior at Palos Verdes High School. She began her piano studies at age four and currently studies with Jinah Chung. Her awards include first place at the California Association of Professional Music Teachers (CAPMT) Sonata/Sonatina Competition, Bronze medal at the Southern California Junior Bach Festival, second place at the MTAC Scholarship Awards, and second place at the Southwestern Youth Music Festival. Robin also plays violin, and is the principal violinist of her own string quartet, Prima Volte. In February, she performed at Carnegie Hall with a national youth orchestra directed by Charles Peltz. She has also performed in "An Evening of John Williams Music" with the Golden State Pops Orchestra and "The Beatles vs. The Rolling Stones—A Musical Shoot Out" with Abbey Road and Jumping Jack Flash, both at the Warner Grand Theater. In addition to music, Robin loves to write. She is part of her school's broadcast and print journalism teams and works as an editor for an independent arts webzine called Flaneur. She is also part of her school's Choreo dance team.

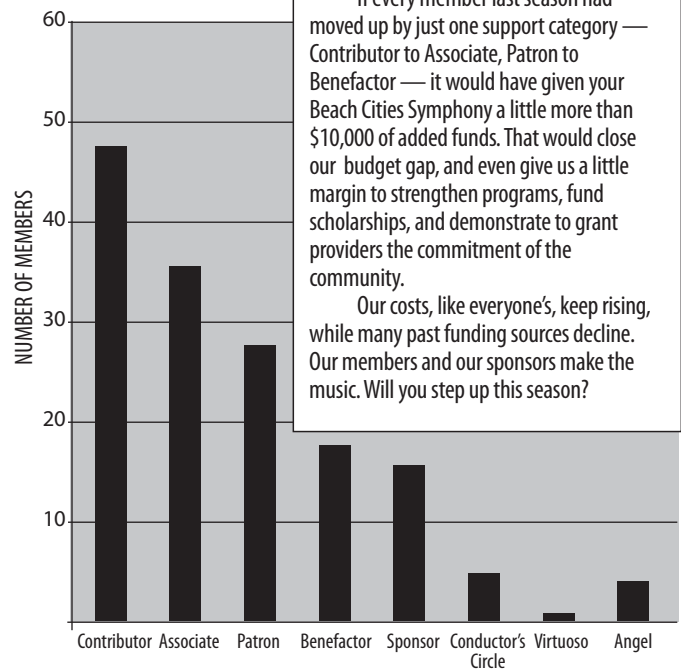
